Walk Every Step with Christ

Holy Week is a week for being mindful. We must set loose the baggage of Lent, and not be deterred by the dazzling sunrise of Easter morning beckoning in the distance.

It's okay for us to be excited for Easter. We've waited so long, after all. In my opinion it's one of the best feelings there is: the yearning we have in our hearts for the Resurrection as we embark on Palm Sunday. And in a purely logical sense, many of us have Easter celebrations for which we are preparing, and practical considerations to contend with. It's going to be a busy week, one likely full of happy distractions.

But my friends, we simply must keep our feet on the ground. Let's not "skip" Holy Week. Resist the urge to flip to the last page of the book, to fast-forward to the final scene of the movie. Don't rob yourself of the journey. This week is a blessed opportunity. It is this week that teaches us who we are. In the span of the Triduum, we have the birthday of the priesthood, the institution of the Eucharist, the sacrifice on Calvary and so many other vivid and meaningful scenes.

It may sound strange, to advise someone to savor the moments of Holy Week. There are so many violent and heartrending moments, after all. But this is the valley of tears, remember — we are not in Heaven yet. And here, in our fallen, sin-filled world, it is the heartrending moments that seem to matter the most.

These are the moments that define us as Catholics. Live them. Cherish them. Be present for each one.

This week, Christ gives us a very parental gift: He shows us his fear, and he shows us how to conquer it. He challenges us to embrace the purpose for which we came to this hour — whatever that hour may hold. Tracy Earl Welliver, MTS ©LPi



Each year at the conclusion of the Holy Thursday Liturgy of the Last Supper, there is a solemn procession to the Altar of Repose on which the Blessed Sacrament is placed. This is the Eve of Good Friday, the time when Jesus experienced the Agony in the Garden. Jesus asks "Can you not watch one hour with me? "

You may plan to make a visit to the Blessed Sacrament until 11:00 pm.



Holy Week Draws Christians Closer to Life in Christ Greetings!

Even at a young age, children will be aware of some of the differences with the liturgy during Holy Week. Parents,

grandparents, and others who guide them in the faith will want to explain that the liturgical calendar reminds us that all times and all seasons belong to God. In each liturgical year, we have the opportunity to celebrate the entirety of Jesus' earthly life, from the Annunciation and Mary's yes to His Ascension and the sending of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Each liturgical year begins with the First Sunday of Advent and ends with the week of the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe. At the beginning of Holy Week, the Church is still in the season of Lent, but at the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper, the liturgical season of the Sacred Paschal Triduum begins.

As Holy Week approaches, and we prepare for the holiest days of the liturgical year, our celebrations become more distinctive. Historians tell us that because this time is so sacred, many of its traditions come to us from very early in Christian history.

The movement of the processions of Holy Week, from Palm Sunday through Holy Saturday, may entrance children. These processions help us to enter into the celebration of the Paschal Mystery. All of Holy Week makes present the greatest events in history so that we, the people of today, might encounter Jesus as the people present in Jerusalem two thousand years ago were able to do. Through this encounter we come to believe in Him, to recognize our vocation to bring His love to all people, and to hope that where He has gone we shall follow.

At the beginning of Mass on Palm Sunday, we gather for the blessing of palms and we sing Hosanna, praising Jesus, the one who saves, as He comes into Jerusalem. We are part of the crowd praising Him as the Savior. At the end of the Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, we process with the Blessed Sacrament and are invited to remain in prayer with Jesus as his friends did after the Last Supper. On Holy Saturday, we begin at the new fire, where the Paschal candle is blessed and we process behind it into the dark church. As the people of Israel followed the pillar of fire to salvation from slavery, we follow the light of Christ, which leads us to salvation. As the light comes to each person, one by one, we see the light of Christ spread throughout the Church as we hope it will spread through the whole world, until God will be all in all and his Kingdom will have no end.

As the Paschal Mystery is made present to us today, we encounter the person of Jesus Christ, through whom comes our salvation.

The Sacred Paschal Triduum

The Paschal or Easter Triduum (Latin for "three days") begins Holy

Thursday evening (which marks the end of Lent) and concludes Easter Sunday evening. Its liturgical services are the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening, the Good Friday service of the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord, and the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening after sunset and then at the Mass during the Day on Easter Sunday.

The Second Vatican Council reminded us of the extraordinary importance of the Triduum: "Christ redeemed us all and gave perfect glory to God principally through his paschal mystery: dying he destroyed our death and rising he restored our life. Therefore the Easter Triduum of the passion and resurrection of Christ is the culmination of the entire liturgical year."

As summit of the liturgical year, the Triduum is experienced as a singular and unified celebration as was the Lord's example of service, suffering, death, and resurrection which they commemorate, namely the Paschal Mystery.
